Twenty-five Years of Service.

On Friday of this week, April 1st, Mr. Arthur F. Turner comp years of service as a letter carrier at the Laconia post-office and will be entitled to wear a silver star on each sleeve of his whiters to denote twenty-five years in the service. Asking from Assistant Postmaster Charles F. Shastany, he is the oldest em-ployee in point of service at the Laconia

April 1st, is also the twenty-fifth annivessary of the inauguration of the carrier service at the Laconia post office, as it was established April 1, 1896 under the late Postmaster John O'Loughin Mr. Turner was one of the four original letter carriers, the others being Messers John M. Guay, Eben Merrill and George F. Plummer, the latter now of Ashland. Mr. Turner is the only one of the original four carriers who has remained in the service, and he has served under Postmasters O'Loughlin; Gilman, Trask and Dyer.

When the carrier service was first established there were four carriers and two substitutes; now there are eight regular cafriers and three substitutes. Then the local office served only Laconia; now Lakeport and The Weirs are stations of the Laconia office

More Booze Captured at Plymouth.

Seventeen cases of gin, valued at \$2000, were captured at Plymouth last Thursday, by Federal inspectors, who located the liquor hidden in the woods and waited many weary hours until the liquor runders appeared to carry off the cases. It appears that the runners were bringing the liquor down from the north-country by auto and got stock in the mud. They hid the, cases in the woods and went down to Franklin to wait for a favorable opportunity to re-toad and proceed, but the officers were tipped off and grabbed the whole outfit.

With the country highways hub-deep with mud, it is rather difficult just now to smuggle liquor from Canada into New Hampshire, and many schemes are being devised to import the booze. One of the navest methods was detected last week when a carload of liquor, covered with baled hay, was captured by prohibition officers at Mystic, Mass., after having been bauled down in a freight train through New Hampshire.
