On Friday afternoon, February 26, 1937, Roy Thompson, 30 year old Tuftonboro school board member, lost his life when a car he was driving on the ice off Haley's Point, Lake Winnepesaukee, sank in about 35 feet of water.

Miss Mary Sullivan, 20, daughter of John Sullivan of Melvin Village narrowly escaped death. The accident occurred late in the afternoon when Mr. Thompson and Miss Sullivan were enroute to a fishing house about a quarter of a mile from the scene of the accident.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Sargent, owners of the fish house, witnessed the accident and Mr. Sargent hurried to the spot of broken ice and with the aid of a long plank rescued the young lady who had jumped from the sinking machine and was floating on a cake of ice.

Mr. Sargent was assisted in the rescue by Clifton and Arthur Smith nearby fishermen. Miss Sullivan was taken to Huggins hospital, Wolfeboro where she was treated for shock and exposure.

Deputy Sheriffs Harry M. Leavitt of Center Ossipee and Robert Drew of Sanbornville who had been summoned by Selectman Ernest Hunter, enlisted the aid of Diver Tilton of Franklin, who found Mr. Thompson's body Saturday, about 20 feet from the car.

Investigators reported that the ice was from 12 to 14 inches thick at the point where the car went down, leaving a gaping hole which measured 10 to 14 feet.

Mr. Thompson was the son of Simon Thompson of Tuftonboro. He was graduated from Fryeburg, Me., academy, and attended the University of Maine. He had been employed as a gardener by Mrs. Amy Kling of Melvin Village.

Besides his father, who has recently been employed at Andover, Me., he is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Doris Davis and Mrs. Eleanor Davis, both of Tuftonboro; and the Misses Blanche and Laura Thompson, both nurses at the Laccenia Hospital; and a brother, Lester Thompson of Tuftonboro.
